PREPARE YOUR NOTEBOOK:

Go to the back of your notebook and count inward about ten pages. Label this page "Glossary." Throughout this document, you will be asked to add words to your glossary.

words as well. Be sure to use the meaning of the word that fit this story; it may not always be the first meaning listed.






